Michael attended various higher education institutions including New Mexico State University – Grants, Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute, University of Pennsylvania, and New Mexico State

University.

Currently, Mr. Ray is the Director of the American Indian Program at New Mexico State University. At NMSU, he has been able to help students find their path in higher education, be it in the undergraduate, graduate, or doctoral levels, while helping students feel accepted and that they have a community away from home here at NMSU.

Also joining us will be AAUW-LC scholarship recipients. We will introduce these students prior to our guest speaker.

AAUW-Las Cruces Fundraising 101

With so many new members and with plenty of great programs to support, it is probably time to tell all members about our fundraising efforts and the use of those funds.

Let's start with the budgeting process. The membership votes in May of each year on the new budget for the upcoming year. Our budget year is July 1-June 30. From there, the board of directors is responsible to monitor and track the use of dues dollars (the local dues collected annually). This part of the budget is primarily used for our day-to-day operations.

ALL other expenses related to programs come from our fundraising efforts. Our members are very generous and we are grateful. A simple directory of those programs are as follows:

The *monthly donation jar* is one way we solicit money. At each membership meeting, we have a donation jar dedicated to one of our programs. The board of directors establishes the recipients for the jar each month. They are: September: GIRLS CAN!, November: Scholarships, January: GIRLS CAN!, February: TECH TREK, April: Scholarships, May: TECH TREK

In addition to the donation jar, we also raise funds through the ynch Creek Farms fundraising effort. (See update elsewhere in this issue of Organ Mountain Views.) At our December social event we also have a Silent Auction. Items donated by members are collected and are available at that December luncheon event. Those two events provide members different ways to give! It is important to note, that 10% of fundraising efforts goes to our operating portion of the annual budget.

GIRLS CAN! is supported by members of AAUW-LC with events like Lynch Creek Farms Fundraising and community donations as well. We are always grateful for businesses and individuals that support our GIRLS CAN! event.

Because TECH TREK is a state-based AAUW event, donations are solicited through our donation jar as well as through the TECH TREK website.

AAUW-LC Scholarship donations come through the donation jars AND can be made directly to the NMSU Foundation. More information about that opportunity will be forthcoming.
