In 2018, the landmark lawsuit Yazzie/Martinez vs. State of New Mexico required New Mexico to repair the inequities in its K-12 education system. It was ruled that the New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) had failed to provide a

sufficient education to all New Mexican children, and in particular to Native American students, English Learners, low-income students, and students with disabilities. The order gave the state until 2019 to adequately fund reform efforts.(1)

Unfortunately, improvement has been slow. For example, according to the National Assessment for Education Progress (NAEP), in 2022, 4th and 8th graders ranked last in the nation in literacy and math scores, and only 20% of New Mexico's students were proficient in reading.(2) The high school graduation rate is 76%, while the national rate is 87%.(3) The PED has had five Secretaries in the last five years and is understaffed.(4)

The good news is that the 2023 NM legislative session passed laws that expanded instructional time in schools and allocated millions of dollars for early childhood education and teacher preparation in reading and math.

AAUW Las Cruces has a long history of helping students, such as getting more

young women into STEM fields. We hope the 2024 legislative session will improve education for all New Mexican students.

- ** Do you know... For 2023-2024 the minimal cost of being a full-time (12 credit hours) student is
- at NMSU, \$278.60 per credit hour for NM residents (\$3,343.20/ 12 hr. semester), \$907.10 for non-residents (\$10,885.20/ 12 hr. semester).
- at DACC \$76.75 per credit hour for Dona Ana County residents (\$921/12 hr. semester), \$85 for NM residents outside of DA county (\$1,119/ 12 hr. semester), \$236.75 for non-residents (\$2,940/ 12 hr. semester).
- -Books & and supplies average \$1,240 per academic year.
- -These costs don't include food, housing, transportation and so much more!!
