## **PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE**

The 2024 New Mexico legislative session has ended, and many of AAUW's education initiatives did well. Millions of dollars were allocated for technical education, school meals,

summer literacy programs, and teacher preparation and retention.(1)

Another major legislative victory was the establishment of a trust fund for the Opportunity Scholarships for college students. New Mexico will set aside nearly \$1 billion to help maintain this program. The trust fund is a smart idea because it will put money into a reserve fund that will draw interest and thus help to offset future declines in oil revenues. The trust fund will be the largest in the country for higher education. Since Opportunity Scholarships were first offered in 2022, college enrollment in New Mexico has increased by ten

percent. (2)

New Mexico has already been providing Lottery Scholarships that pay tuition for high school graduates who immediately enroll full-time in college. The Opportunity Scholarships are more inclusive because they pay tuition for returning or older students who enroll part-time or full-time to seek career-oriented certificates, associate degrees, or bachelor degrees.

These scholarship programs, however, do not pay for graduate school. And college students face hurdles in addition to tuition and fees such as expensive textbooks, living expenses, family issues, transportation, and child care.

AAUW-Las Cruces' True Grit scholarships, the AAUW Las Cruces Scholarship NMSU Endowment for Women, and the NCCWSL scholarships all play an important role in supporting women students and augmenting the college funds students receive from the state.
