General Meeting

Our speaker for October is Dr. Dulcinea Lara. She is the Director of the Borderlands and Ethnic Studies Program and Associate Professor in the Criminal Justice Department at New Mexico State University.



Dr. Dulcinea Lara was born and raised in a colonia in Southern New Mexico by parents who both have multiple-generations worth of roots in these lands. She holds a doctorate in Comparative Ethnic Studies from the University of California at Berkeley.

She is the inaugural department head of the Borderlands and Ethnic Studies Department, a department struggled for by community, students, and faculty at NMSU since the late 1960s. Her research and public-facing work is multifaceted and trans-disciplinary. It includes the co-creation of an Ethnic Studies museum exhibition, Pasos Ajenos; K-12 Ethnic Studies curriculum development in partnership with educators, students, and the New Mexico Public Education Department; a Peoples of New Mexico film series; and most recently a piece co-authored with her colleague, Manal Hamzeh, titled "Struggle on Struggle: Rooting in Ancestral Fugitive Resistance Victories to Build an Ethnic Studies Sumud Movement in New Mexico" a reflection work that builds land-based solidarity between Palestinians and New Mexicans in shared struggle.

Dr. Lara's areas of interest include visual cultural studies, decolonial studies in service to understanding Borderlands colonias, and museum and representation studies at NMSU.

We look forward to meeting Dr. Lara and learning more about her work.

AAUW-Las Cruces Co-Sponsored Election Forums and Election Information

The League of Women Voters of Southern New Mexico is hosting two non-partisan candidate forums in October. AAUW-Las Cruces is co-sponsoring these forums, along with the NAACP Doña Ana County. The first forum is on **Tuesday**, **Oct. 1** at the Las Cruces City Hall Council Chambers from 5:30-7:30. This forum will be for the candidates for county commissioners (Districts 2, 4, & 5), county clerk, and district attorney.

The second forum will be on **Tuesday**, **Oct. 8** at Las Cruces City Hall Council Chambers from 5:30-7:30. This forum will be for candidates for State Senator (Districts 36 & 38) and State Representative (Districts 34, 36, & 53).

ACADEMIC OUTREACH

Did you know??

AAUW-LC supports education and equity for girls and women in our area through several different programs. In addition to Girls Can! & Tech Trek, we administer and fund our own True Grit Awards and NCCWSL Scholarships. We also have an established NMSU AAUW-

LC Endowed Scholarship Fund that is funded by our members and administered through NMSU Foundation and NMSU Scholar Dollar\$ Financial Aid.

- True Grit Awards are for high school senior girls who have overcome obstacles to earn a high school diploma and plan to attend college or a technical school/program.
- NCCWSL (National Conference for College Women Student Leaders)
 Scholarships are for NMSU female college students to attend the conference.
- NMSU AAUW-LC Endowed Scholarships are for undergraduate students at NMSU-LC and DACC who have completed at least one semester of college and maintain a 2.5 GPA with preference given to women pursuing STEM degrees.
- True Grit Award and NCCWSL Scholarship recipients are chosen each Spring by Selection Task Forces through an application process.
- Last year we were able to grant five \$500 True Grit Awards, three NCCWSL
 Scholarships (conference registration and airfare), and eight \$500 NMSU Endowed
 Scholarships.
- The amount and number of awards/scholarships that we give each year is determined based on our fundraising efforts. (NMSU Endowed Scholarships are based on the Earnings Fund holdings.)

Thanks to your generosity we are able to continue to help promote the wellbeing of young women in our community! If you are interested in being on a scholarship/award task force, please let me know!

AAUW-LC receives 15% of purchases that are marked for fundraising. *Please note: not all items qualify for our fundraising efforts.*


