General Meeting

Our speaker for April 12 is Dr. Katherine Ortega Courtney. She started at NMSU in July 2020 in the College of Agriculture, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, Extension Home Economics Unit.



Katherine Ortega Courtney is a leading voice in data-driven policy, community transformation, and childhood trauma prevention. With a PhD in Experimental Psychology from Texas Christian University's Institute of Behavioral Research, she brings deep expertise to every conversation. A former Juvenile Justice Epidemiologist and Bureau Chief for Child Protective Services Research in New Mexico, she has dedicated her career to championing data-informed solutions to systemic challenges. As co-founder of the New Mexico Data Leaders for Child Welfare program, she has empowered leaders to harness data for meaningful change.

Dr. Courtney's impact extends beyond policy—she has led groundbreaking community initiatives through the Santa Fe Community Foundation and the New Mexico Early Childhood Development Partnership.

Dr. Courtney is the co-author of *Anna, Age Eight*, the book that sparked a movement and led to the creation of the Anna, Age Eight Institute, where she serves as co-director. Alongside Dominic Cappello, she also co-wrote *100% Community*, a blueprint for creating trauma-free, family-friendly communities. Whether engaging with policymakers, educators, or advocates, Dr. Ortega Courtney delivers compelling insights, data-driven strategies, and an undeniable passion for building a better future.

PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

At the time I'm writing this, the 60-day New Mexico 2025 Legislative session is nearing an end, and several bills that accord with AAUW-NM's Public Policy priorities are moving through legislative committees. These include the *Paid Family and Medical Leave Act*

and a bill that would increase taxes on alcohol purchases in order to reduce alcoholrelated deaths.

Three major public safety bills have already passed the NM House and Senate on a bipartisan basis and were signed into law by Governor Lujan Grisham on February 27. *The Criminal Competency and Treatment Act* will help decrease the number of offenders who are both violent and mentally ill, and who are repeatedly released onto the streets, by requiring confined treatment programs. This bill also increases penalties for car thefts and fentanyl trafficking.

A second bill signed into law will establish a behavioral health trust fund to provide long-term financing for statewide behavioral health programs.

The third bill signed into law creates a behavioral health executive committee to coordinate regional behavioral health efforts.

Spring has Sprung!

If you need help with your Spring cleaning and chores, our student member Neyda Moreno has an opportunity for you. She is a member of NMSU *Aggies Without Limits*. Read on for information about how we can help them and help ourselves in return.

□□□NMSU AWL "Daisy Chains"

Aggies Without Limits is a NMSU organization committed to serving and improving communities and the environment through hard work and outreach. Each year, we extend our efforts beyond our local community by organizing international trips to assist countries in need. This year (Summer 2025) members of AWL will travel to Nicaragua to build a health center and renovate a bridge, whose absence has made it difficult for locals to travel to the next town.

All travel expenses are covered by the participating *AWL* members, who are responsible for funding their own trip. To help make this opportunity more affordable, we have established a system called "Daisy Chains". Through this initiative, community members can request assistance with various tasks such as yard work, landscaping, cleaning, etc.

This is how it works:

- The requestor sets a fair hourly wage and determines the number of helpers required. (Most people pay them \$12-\$20 per hour.)
- Tasks typically range from 1 to 4 hours per day, for as many days as needed but weekends are preferred by students.
- All money earned goes into the accounts of (only) the individuals who participated and helps them pay for their trip expenses.

We currently have about 50 active members eager to assist with chores while raising funds for their trip. If you are interested in hiring a student(s) through Daisy Chains, please contact Brandon Garcia at 505-347-6234, and he will be happy to answer any questions and make arrangements.
