General Meeting

Dr. Mary Ulrich is the Executive Director of the Division of Workforce and Community Engagement of Doña Ana Community College. She works to promote student success in workforce and career training programs to realize positive outcomes in the communities served by DACC. Some of the current projects are the DACC Truck Driving Academy, the Career Pathway Certification programs which provide skills-based training in logistics, warehousing, manufacturing and transportation based in the Sunland Park Campus location, and the Digital Skills Academy that assists community members to develop basic computer skills.

Dr. Tricia Brainard is the Director of Adult Education at Doña Ana Community College, where she leads one of the largest ESL programs in New Mexico, serving over 800 English language learners and 400 high school equivalency students annually. She has served at DACC for nearly three years, working to expand access, improve outcomes, and remove barriers for adult learners. Recent initiatives include a redesigned onboarding process to identify GED readiness—doubling HSE enrollment and revealing that nearly 300 students begin the program ready to test. Her team also provides academic support in reading, writing, and numeracy for students in the DACC Truck Driving Academy, helping bridge the gap between technical training and foundational skills.

The Division of Workforce and Community Education at DACC offers a wide range of programs designed to support adult learners, job seekers, and community members pursuing new skills and career pathways. During this presentation, we will provide an overview of our services—including Adult Education, customized training, career and workforce readiness preparation, and community enrichment programs—and highlight ways AAUW members can support our mission through referrals, advocacy, and informal mentoring.

And of course we will have excellent speakers. It was very good to see so many members at April's General Meeting; we hope to see at least as many on May 10. This will be the last General Meeting for the 2024-2025 year, so let's go out with a bang!

Charcuterie Boards for Sale? You Tell Us!

We need your help. We will be offering sets of charcuterie utensils, as outlined below, for sale in the Fall. We are also <u>considering</u> offering fused glass charcuterie boards. They will be available in several sizes and designs. However, the glass is expensive and hard to get. Since glass is expensive, it would be impractical for our artist friend, Kay Gross, to buy the glass for the trays without knowing approximately how many she will be able to sell. So, for the first time ever, we are conducting a survey to see how many members would be interested in purchasing a board.

At the May 10 General Meeting, we will have samples to look at. The large (about 14") will cost \$45. There is a medium square plate for \$35. And a smaller oblong one is \$25. In stores they probably would sell for 3 times that much. There is no obligation to buy, but we would like serious survey replies only.

This is a trial run. If members are not interested in purchasing any, that's fine. We just need to know pretty well how many would sell. The survey forms will be on the tables at the meeting. If you want to talk about sizes and colors, you can chat with Donna Yargosz at the back sales table before or after the meeting.

What Is Charcuterie?

Charcuterie (shar-KOO-ter-ee) is originally a French word for cured meats. Today it describes a board or large plate offering cured meats, cheeses, fruits, nuts, spreads, olives, etc. The best boards (so they say) go by the 3-3-3 rule: 3 types of meat (such as salami, prosciutto, ham, sausage), 3 cheeses of various kinds (ex.: from cows, goats, and/or sheep), and 3 accompaniments (ex: olives, artichoke hearts, grapes, nuts). Charcuterie is the perfect finger food buffet and usually offers a wide assortment.

To handle the items on the charcuterie board, often special cheese knives and forks are used. In the Fall, sets of beaded charcuterie utensils will be offered for sale.

New Item at the Sales Table on May 10

We usually sell name tag lanyards (\$10) at meetings, and last month we added beaded cheese (or paté or peanut butter or jam) spreaders (\$15) and took orders

for beaded salad fork and spoon sets (\$25). For the May 10 meeting we also will offer 4-strand, stretchy, semi-precious gemstone bracelets (\$35). The stones we used are garnets, malachite, amethyst, tigereye, quartz, lapis, jasper, howlite (faux turquoise), amazonite, and a little bit of aquamarine. Each bracelet is stacked by using the little jewelry carabiner, so you could also wear one strand, or two, or three as you prefer. We have only 20 on hand, minus whatever we sell at the State Convention. And you could always order one for yourself or as a gift.

Please come by and see Lynne Lord and/or Donna Yargosz at the sales table. We can take cash, check, or credit card. **As always, proceeds benefit the Scholarship Fund**.



PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

The 2025 New Mexico legislative session is over, and over 100 new laws have been signed by our Governor. Unfortunately, one of AAUW's longtime initiatives, the Paid Family and Medical Leave Act, didn't make it to the finish line. The bill passed in the House but died

in the Senate over a disagreement about funding. According to Meredith Machen, Public Policy Director of AAUW-NM, this bill will be introduced again in next year's legislature.

However, many bills supported by AAUW-NM did become law. Last month I wrote about three successful public safety bills. Here are a few additional new laws: New Mexico public school teachers' base salaries will be increasing. Beginning teachers will start at \$55,000, midlevel teachers will earn at least \$65,000 and experienced teachers (9+years) will make at least \$75,000.

The state budget will allocate more funding to support middle and high school students and English Language Learners.

The Anti-Distraction Policy in Schools law requires school districts to implement policies for cell phones in school, such as keeping students from using cell phones during class time.

The Non-Major Party Voters in Primary Elections law will let voters unaffiliated with a major political party participate in primary elections by requesting a major party's ballot.

A Medicaid trust fund will be created that the state can use if the federal government significantly cuts Medicare contributions.


