Public Policy

It's election season! This year we have only municipal elections. *Early voting starts Oct.* 7, and *election day is Nov. 4.*



In Las Cruces, three school board seats and three city council seats are in contention. In addition, we will decide on a GO (General Obligation) bond question from the Doña Ana county commissioners.

Because AAUW focuses so much on education, we need to pay particular attention to the school board election. (To review AAUW's educational initiatives, go to AAUW Education.) The current school board has supported LBGTQ students, resisted efforts to ban books, improved multicultural and multilingual education, and promoted inclusive curricula, including STEM.

For an overview about the upcoming election, the races, and candidates, go toLas Cruces Bulletin Council and School Board Elections. As this *Bulletin* article notes, the City Council races will use ranked-choice voting. For information about this process, see this Ranked-Choice Voting Facebook video produced by the Doña Ana Elections Bureau.

To check on your voter registration, go to **Dona Ana County Elections Bureau**.

To find your precinct, learn where you can vote, and see your personal sample ballot, go to **NM Secretary of State Voter Information Portal** The sample ballot will be available in early October.

The League of Women Voters produces its own Voter Guide in print and electronic form. (vote411.org). Look for the printed Voter Guide as an insert in *The Las Cruces Bulletin* starting in early October. In the League's Voter Guide, candidates respond to questions about their positions. *The Las Cruces Bulletin* is also publishing candidates' explanations about their positions.

Be sure to vote, and get your friends and family members to vote!

Academic Outreach

AAUW-LC strongly promotes girls' and women's education! Programs supported, funded, and created by Las Cruces branch members reach an age continuum from girls to women:



6th grade girls in Dona Ana County can experience *Girls Can!*, an annual career exploration conference presented by professional women. The concept was designed by National AAUW in 1993 to promote young girls' interest in STEM and was first presented in 1996 in Las Cruces at Lynn Middle School. The conference was moved to DACC in 2017 to give attendees the experience of going to classes on a college campus. We will be celebrating the 30th anniversary of AAUW-LC Girls Can! this year!

8th grade girls can experience *Tech Trek*, an annual 5 day summer STEM camp. The concept was designed by National AAUW to promote girls' interest and immersion in STEM fields on a college campus. The first AAUW Tech Trek-NM was held at NMSU main campus in 2014 and a couple of years later moved to New Mexico Tech in Socorro NM. To attend, girls must go through a statewide application and selection process.

<u>Graduating high school senior girls</u> in Las Cruces may apply to receive an AAUW-LC *True Grit* Award. This award program originated with AAUW-LC in 1988 and was first given as a gift certificate or a dictionary to a young woman at the San Andres Alternative High School (now known as Rio Grande Preparatory Institute). Since that time the awards have grown to be several significant monetary awards which are granted annually through a selection process before high school graduation.

<u>Undergraduate NMSU or DACC</u> college women may be eligible to receive an *AAUW-LC Endowed Scholarship*. This endowment fund was established by AAUW-LC members in 1988 through NMSU Foundation and was fully vested in 2000. Scholarships are granted annually from the earnings fund and are administered by NMSU Financial Aid Office and Scholar Dollar\$.

<u>Graduate students</u> may apply for national AAUW Fellowships & Grants but we are considering establishing our own graduate student award program. **Stay tuned...!!**



Girls Can!

March 7, 2026 is the date for the next Girls Can!.

Mark your calendars – we will need a lot of volunteers to help on the day of the event and as many to assist committees before March 7. To address the congestion from previous years we plan on having three different entrances when the girls arrive. This means we will need a few more volunteers from about 7:30 a.m. until 9:00.



We now have commitments from more than twenty presenters and rooms reserved for as many as thirty workshops. As they were last year, workshops will be organized in career clusters. While many workshops have been presented annually for several years, career cluster organization will encourage girls to choose workshops in diverse areas.

Two new clusters will be added in 2026. One will focus on professions in communication both for information and entertainment and the second on careers for entrepreneurs and businesses. "Science & Engineering," "Responders & Enforcers" and "Health and Medicine" will continue from last year, but they will be modified slightly to add more diversity. Various areas of the Arts will be infused in different clusters. Our goal in expanding offerings is that our student participants will be afforded experiences from a wide range of possibilities for their career futures.

Girls Can! 2026 will mark the thirtieth anniversary of the event. We hope to celebrate that milestone in myriad ways and are looking for someone/s to lead that effort.

Volunteer Needed for Name Tag Lanyards




