What if I forget?



Public Policy

The U.S. educational system is under assault, imperiling student access and the social mobility that education brings. The Department of Education has been all but eliminated, its tools to ensure civil rights for special education and other students and its



ability to evaluate educational access severely weakened. Universities around the country have lost billions in federal funding in health and science research. Programs that help first generation and under-represented students have been eliminated. The federal government is now intruding on decisions regarding admissions, curriculum, and faculty. Transformative programs for K-12 students have been eliminated.

AAUW is a vital voice in pushing back against this war on education. In a recent piece published in The Contrarian, her Substack newsletter, former Washington Post columnist Jennifer Rubin cited AAUW's statement on higher education as evidence of resistance against efforts to crush higher education, citing AAUW's statement that "our nation's future depends on higher education that is accessible, inclusive, and free from political interference."

AAUW's 2025 Strategic Plan focuses on expanding access to higher education. By supporting AAUW through our memberships and donations, as well as the mentoring that we do with students, we can play an important role in resisting this assault on education.

Mark your calendars for our October Going Places Adventure

Wednesday, October 15 we will visit the NMSU Herbaria the oldest herbarium in the state.

NMSU herbaria resources represent the premier reference collection for the entire southern half of New Mexico, surrounding areas and elements of northern Mexico. The herbaria include more than 80% of all vascular plant type specimens housed within the state. Professional botanists have used specimens from the herbaria as the basis for a guide to the grasses of New Mexico and a series of comprehensive books on all aspects of flora, which have become standard references for the state.

If you are a lover of all things "plants", I urge you to check out the NMSU Herbaria Website, a source of excellent and interesting videos

Our tour of the herbaria begins at 2 pmat the NMSU Biology Annex and should last 45 – 60 minutes. The tour is limited to 12 persons, so please let me know as soon as possible if you would like to participate.


